


OneDrive Is Not Backup

- OneDrive is not a backup solution. OneDrive is for file synchronization. It's critical you understand the difference.
- File synchronization means the contents of the locations are kept in sync: as a mirror reflection of each other.



OneDrive Is Not Backup

- OneDrive is file synchronization
- OneDrive keeps two locations in sync: the OneDrive folder on your computer and the online copy at onedrive.com.



OneDrive Is Not Backup

- Hopefully, it's now clear exactly what OneDrive is supposed to do.
- Question: I put files into my OneDrive on my PC. They uploaded to the cloud, so I
 deleted them on my computer. The damn thing deleted the online copy, and now the
 file's gone!
- About that delete ...
- You deleted the file from the OneDrive folder on your computer, and the file was deleted in your online OneDrive account. This is exactly what OneDrive is supposed to do: keep the two locations in sync.

Iconic Photos From Each Decade of the 20th Century

- In the mid-1820s, French inventor Joseph Nicéphore Niépce stood at an upstairs window of his estate in Saint-Loup-de-Varennes in Burgundy, France.
- In his hand he held a primitive camera.
- After at least eight hours of exposure, Niépce created the world's first — or at least oldest surviving — photograph, known as "View From the Window at Le Gras."
- In that moment, an entirely new medium was born.

The First Photo



In the 1930s, a skyscraper was rotated 90 degrees while everyone kept working inside.

- In 1929, the **Indiana Bell Telephone Company** purchased the **Central Union Telephone Company**, along with its eight-story headquarters in downtown **Evansville**, **Indiana**.
- Architect Kurt Vonnegut Sr. suggested they could move it across the lot — 52 feet sideways, followed by a <u>90-degree turn</u> — and expand from there.
- The eight-story, 11,000-ton building end up safely in its new location, but the offices remained fully operational during the monthlong moving process, with no disruptions to telephone service.

Map Shows the Language Each Country Around the World Wants To Learn the Most

- And while Al translators and dubbed shows are more common, many people understand the true beauty of immersing oneself in a different tongue.
- However, which language people wish they could speak varies around the world, as it is dictated by a ton of circumstances. To answer this question,
- WordTips set out to map which language each country wants to learn the most—and their findings are quite revealing.
- Some Examples follow.

In-N-Out Workers Reveal Which 'Secret Menu' Items Are Fake



- For years, In-N-Out has nurtured rumors of several off-menu orders.
- While the items aren't listed on the restaurant's dining room menu, hence their "secret" label, they're available for anyone to reference on the official In-N-Out <u>website</u>.
 - Double Meat: Two patties on a single bun
 - 3x3, or Triple Triple: Three patties with three slices of cheese on a single bun
 - 4x4, or Quad Quad: Four patties with four slices of cheese on a single bun
 - Grilled Cheese: Melted cheese on a bun with no patties
 - Protein Style: Patties wrapped in lettuce instead of a bun
 - Animal Style: A burger with extra spread, grilled onions, and a patty cooked with mustard
- Strictly speaking, these are semi-custom orders, not "secret" items.

- There are a few more that appear legitimate:
 - Flying Dutchman: Two plain patties with cheese and an optional onion wrap
 - Lemon Fries: French fries with squeezed lemon
 - Scooby Snack: Plain patty in a wrapper
 - Roadkill Fries: French fries with crumbled meat
 - Neapolitan Shake: Chocolate, vanilla, and strawberry milkshake

The ancient Romans had central heating.

- The ancient Romans used many technologies that seem surprisingly modern — including hypocausts, a precursor to central heating that's like today's radiant floors.
- The technique was used to heat public bathhouses, and also used in private homes and villas, in chillier areas of the Empire.
- Buildings heated with a <u>hypocaust system</u> were raised up on pillars, creating an empty space underneath.
- An external furnace called a *praefurnium*, which was often woodburning, piped in hot air to the area. That air would warm the stone or tile floor above, known as a *suspensura*.

Duct Tape

In 1943, Vesta Stoudt, an Illinois woman with two sons serving in the U.S. Navy, was working in an ordnance plant when she noticed a problem with the ammunition boxes she was packing. The boxes were sealed with paper tape with a tab to open them, but this tab could easily tear off, leaving soldiers potentially scrambling to open the boxes in lifethreatening situations. So, Stoudt came up with the idea of a waterproof fabric tape with which to seal the boxes — an idea she sent to none other than **President Franklin D. Roosevelt**. Impressed, the President sent her letter to the War Production Board, which soon came up with what we now know as duct tape.



Radar

The fundamental principle underlying modern radar (which is actually an acronym for "radio detection and ranging") was first observed in 1886 by physicist Heinrich Hertz, who found that electromagnetic waves could be reflected from various objects. It was during World War II, however, that modern, **practical radar was developed.** Britain had already established a chain of radar stations along its south and east coasts by the outbreak of the war, allowing for the detection of enemy aircraft at a range of 80 miles. The British then invented the cavity magnetron in 1940, paving the way for far more compact, powerful, and sensitive radar units (and, as it happens, microwave ovens).

Dinosaurs were alive longer than they've been extinct.

- Dinosaurs have been extinct for **65 million years**.
- But they were alive for **165 million years**.
- Our own time on earth began a few hundred thousand years ago, and accounts for just 0.007% of the Earth's history.
- If you compressed the planet's history into one calendar year beginning with the Triassic:
 - Dinosaurs would have appeared on January 1
 - Would have gone extinct in the third week of September
 - Humans wouldn't have shown up until December 31

Giant catapult launches satellites into orbit without the need for rocket fuel

- SpinLaunch plans to loft small satellites into low Earth orbit by 2026
- SpinLaunch, a California-based start-up developing a rotating arm that can fling small satellites into near-Earth space has pulled off its 10th successful suborbital test launch in less than a year.
- The 10th successful flight demonstrated that "standard satellite components are inherently compatible with SpinLaunch's launch environment"
- The payloads had to survive up to **10,000 Gs** (that's 10,000 times the force of Earth's gravity) as the 108-foot-long rotating arm hidden inside a white casing spun up the payload faster than the speed of sound.

How To Freeze Your Credit If Your Information Was Leaked in the Social Security Breach

- It recommended the public take a number of steps to safeguard their information, including freezing their credit, which "means potential creditors cannot get your credit report."
- It also means bad actors cannot take out loans or open credit cards, since the freeze locks the data at the consumer reporting agency until the individual gives permission for the release of said data.
- There are other alternatives to a credit freeze, including a credit lock and a fraud alert, but a credit freeze is the most effective.

How To Freeze Your Credit If Your Information Was Leaked in the Social Security Breach

- The best way to go about freezing your credit is creating an account with the three big credit bureaus: Experian, Equifax and TransUnion.
- These agencies are also <u>recommended by the U.S. government</u>.
- A request must be made separately to each, though the service is free.
- Once an account is created with a username and password, users can simply click a button and freeze their credit.
- This request can also be submitted by mail or phone with each agency.
 Typically, the freeze will take place within one business day if requested over the phone or online, and within three business days if requested by mail.

- ChromeOS boots in a fraction of the time it takes any other operating system to boot.
- If you want a fast laptop at a reasonable price, get a Chromebook.

• That's partly because ChromeOS is "mostly" a web browser masquerading as an OS, but even with Linux and Android app support enabled, you'll seldom have a problem.

5. Chromebooks are flexible

- Chromebook Plus laptops have solved this with the <u>File Sync</u> feature, which gives you offline access to your Google Drive accounts.
- You can do your work while away from a connection, and when you return home, the files are automatically uploaded to the cloud.

6. Chromebooks are secure

- Thanks to the Linux kernel, ChromeOS is a very secure option.
- Chromebooks are also secured with verification at boot, a read-only OS that blocks executables, data encryption, sandboxing, and more.
- In Chromebook's 10-year history, only 57 ChromeOS security exploits have been documented.
- You won't need antivirus or anti-malware. Just make sure to apply all updates when they become available, avoid suspicious websites, and only install extensions from the official Google Chrome Store.

7 reasons why a Chromebook is the best laptop for most people

• 7. Chromebooks can be easily restored

- Should you wind up having a problem with ChromeOS misbehaving (extremely unlikely), you can simply do a "powerwash" (a factory reset) and log back into your Google account.
- You'll find everything there, minus whatever problem you were experiencing (and anything you'd previously saved to the Downloads folder).
- No other operating system can compete with ChromeOS' ability to factory reset and return you to a pristine working state without losing your data, bookmarks, and apps.



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
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

Boston Dynamics' new video shows that its humanoid robot doesn't need a human

- The company wants everyone to know its new all-electric Atlas robot can function autonomously.
- The task of moving engine covers "between supplier containers and a mobile sequencing dolly" isn't especially exciting, but it demonstrates several of the new robot's capabilities working together.
- After being provided with only a "list of bin locations to move parts between," Atlas uses various sensors and machine learning models to determine the location of bins and how it needs to manipulate its body, arms, and three-fingered hands to grasp and relocate the parts inside them.
